PRESENTATION SUMMARY

Paimio Sanatorium completed in 1933 was of key monument in the career of architects Alvar and Aino Aalto. A sanatorium was particularly suitable for a building following the ideals of Functionalism. The entire complex was constructed in accordance with Aaltos' philosophy, down to the smallest details of the furniture, and colour scheme in collaboration with the artist Eino Kauria.

With the advent of antibiotics, tuberculosis could be cured, so the sanatorium was gradually converted into a general hospital from the 1960s onwards. Alvar Aalto and later his office, Alvar Aalto & Co, designed the alterationsuntil 1994. In 1993 the building was protected as a national monument.

By 2015 all hospital functions were transferred elsewhere and new uses are sought. Those must be in harmony with this unique architectural whole. As well as the issues of the management are crucial. For that the Conservation Management Plan by Aalto Foundation provides good basis. Still there are questions, many spaces have been tailored specifically, like the operation wing for example. There is a vast number of similar relatively small rooms, in the contrary adjustable spaces for variable needs are limited. These issues must be resolved on seeking UNESCO World Heritage status.
